The Andrew Hill student council is headed by ASB vice-president, Steve Aven.

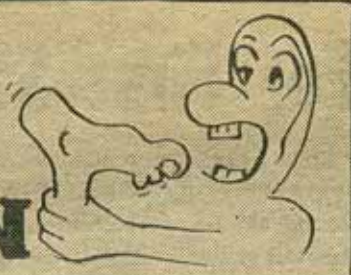
"The purpose of student council is to accumulate all the different guiderooms. We will handle problems as they happen," remarked Steve Aven.

Employers have pledged two million jobs this year for 16-21 year olds. Many of these jobs are in the health field. Reports show widespread shortages in this vital and rewarding field. Over three million workers will be needed over the next decade to meet the growing demand for medical and health services. There are positions for various educational levels.

College entrance exams and scholarship tests will be administered earlier this year than ever before. Seniors interested in college information and testing dates should see Mrs. Perry immediately.

The state colleges have officially changed the determination of eligibility. This change will be effective for fall, 1967, admissions. The determination is based on grade point average, ACT or SAT scores.

The championship-contending Hill Falcons go after their third straight victory tomorrow afternoon when they play Piedmont Hills on the James Lick field.

Chances for Hill's first league championship are very bright if the team can improve on its pass defense and can play tough football against the weaker teams. If the fleet Falcons can avoid looking forward to their game with first place Willow Glen, they should hand Piedmont Hills a three-touchdown defeat.
